

Statement by H.E. Pisanu Chanvitan Ambassador, Permanent Representative of Thailand On the Universal Periodic Review of Brazil 25 May 2012

Madame President,

Thailand is impressed by the serious commitment of the Government and the wide range of measures put in place to advance the enjoyment of human rights of all Brazilian citizens.

As noted in the country report that many human rights challenges in Brazil stem from the historical and structural inequalities, we **recommend** that the government continue to address the grievance of and empower vulnerable groups — particularly women, children, indigenous people, and people of African descent - by reducing urban-rural discrepancies and promoting equal access to opportunities for all, especially access to health care, education, employment, housing and social security.

In connection with Government's efforts to improve the prison conditions, we **recommend** the Government to pay extra attention to the special needs of women prisoners by considering implementing the Bangkok Rules. ¹ Thailand stands ready to share our experiences with Brazil in this matter.

Lastly, we note the adoption of the Law on Access to Public Information which prohibits assigning classifies status to documents relating to human rights violation, as well as the establishment of the Truth Commission to promote accountability and transitional justice in the country. We believe these are but a few of good practices that others may be able to learn from Brazil's experiences.
