

Statement by Delegation of Indonesia  
14<sup>th</sup> Session of the Working Group on Universal Periodic Review  
Consideration of the UPR Report of Peru  
Geneva, 1 November 2012

Madam President,

My delegation would like to welcome the Delegation of Peru headed by H.E. Dr. Henry Jose Avila Herrera, Vice-Minister for Human Rights and Access to Justice, and thank them for their national report and continued engagement in the UPR process.

Indonesia commends the Government of Peru for the extensive and inclusive national reporting process, involving various national stakeholders. We also welcome the fact that valuable technical support was provided by the Regional Office for South America of the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights.

Madam President,

My delegation welcomes the enactment of "the Plan for equal opportunities for persons with disabilities 2009-2018" that provides clear guidelines for the Government, in promoting various aspects of the human rights of persons with disabilities. We also welcome the formulation of the strategy for the integration of persons with disabilities that includes education, health, labour, housing and regional administration sectors. In light of the importance of furthering the rights of persons with disabilities, **we recommend the Government of Peru accelerate the full implementation of the plan and strategy.**

Indonesia welcomes continued measures on the eradication of trafficking in persons in the country, including the enactment of "the National Plan of Action to Combat Trafficking in Persons 2011-2016". We also believe that the newly established "Standing Multisectoral Working Group on Trafficking in Persons" will play important role in proposing an integrated guidelines, policies, plans and strategies against such crimes.

Indonesia applauds efforts made by the Government in the field of the right to education, including measures taken in increasing the literacy rate through "the National Mobilization for Literacy Programme". Noting that the literacy rate vary according to residential area, **we recommend the Government of Peru prioritize its efforts on the situation in the rural area,** where the number of literacy rate is still relatively lower then that in the urban area.

In conclusion, Madam President, Indonesia fully shares the view that promoting the observance of human rights is a never-ending task. It merits, and receives, constant attention within the national sphere, with a view to improving the human rights situation. We therefore wish the people and Government of Peru every success in their future endeavours toward such objectives.
