We would like to reiterate the strong commitment of the Royal Government of Bhutan to pursue the highest standards in the promotion and protection of human rights of its citizens. However, as in all countries, much remains to be done and like all developing countries, Bhutan also faces many challenges and constraints that we have yet to overcome. We have spelt these out during the interactive dialogue today.

In conclusion, we would like to once again thank all the delegations for their participation in our review today and on our part we reiterate our commitment to further strengthening the promotion and protection of human rights in our country.
