

## United Nations Human Rights Council 25th Session of the Working Group of the Universal Periodic Review 2<sup>nd</sup> Cycle Review of Thailand, 11 May 2016

## Statement by Austria

Austria warmly welcomes H.E. and the delegation of Thailand to the UPR and commends the country for its efforts undertaken since the last review including steps taken to improve the situation of women in prison or the elaboration of the Draft Act on Prevention and Suppression of Torture and Enforced Disappearance.

Austria is concerned by the introduction of the 2014 Interim Constitution and the special powers of the NCPO which limit human rights and the rule of law,[i.a. by granting military personnel powers of the police and the judiciary and extending the jurisdiction of military courts to civilians for certain offences.]

Other areas of concern are i.a. the minimum age of criminal responsibility, which still remains - regardless the raise from 7 years to 10 years since the first UPR - below internationally acceptable standards. Tor the safety of journalists.

## Austria therefore offers the following recommendations:

- Guarantee the rights to freedom of expression and assembly and ensure an inclusive debate among all stakeholders with regard to the upcoming referendum and the enactment of a new constitution;
- Work towards ending the prosecution of civilians in military courts and transfer all cases of civilians facing proceedings before military courts to civilian courts;
- Inform UNESCO on the actions taken to prevent the impunity of the perpetrators of the killings of journalists and to notify UNESCO of the status of the judicial inquiries conducted;
- Ratify the Rome Statute and APIC of the ICC, the Genocide Convention, the Optional Protocols to ICCPR and CAT;

-Take all necessary measures to prevent lawyers from being threatened, intimidated, or subjected to improper interference while exercising their professional duties;
